

HAPPY LANDING



As dangerous as it may seem, orbiting in a space shuttle 135 miles above the earth at a speed of 17,000 miles per hour is relatively risk-free. Compared to what? Compared to the risks involved in blasting the shuttle up into space in the first place, and most certainly, compared to the risks involved in bringing it back down to earth. To go from orbit to terra firma, an astronaut must guide his craft through the turbulent and fiery "re-entry" of the earth's atmosphere, where any wrong maneuver can result in instant incineration.

It is no mistake that the word "re-entry" is also applied to the experience a returning

missionary must go through as he or she makes the adjustment from life on the mission field to life back at home. Like the astronaut guiding his craft back into the earth's atmosphere, there are many potential hazards that the returning missionary must negotiate. He or she too, must cover dangerous territory; dangerous in terms of the emotional, spiritual and relational damage that can occur if the process is not handled correctly. Indeed, if not handled correctly, the returning missionary may barely escape with his or her emotional well-being and faith intact.

"Is re-entry really that potentially devastating?" you may ask. "What could really go wrong? After all, a missionary is returning home to friends and family who love and support him. What could the problem be?" I'm sure many astronauts have been tempted to ask such questions of themselves as they spin contentedly through space. All seems so calm and orderly, until the retro-rockets are fired and the space shuttle slips out of orbit and begins its descent to earth.

The above excerpt is from the book "Re-Entry" now being published. The subject of re-entry has been close to my heart ever since as an eleven-year-old, China-born MK, I was dropped into a strange place called England, my parents' homeland. I looked like a proper little English boy, spoke like one, even dressed like one. But deep inside I was something else entirely. My "home" was not England - it was somewhere "back there." I had travelled widely, so **my** world was all the world. As I reflect on those days, I guess I felt like a refugee. I was pretty mixed-up.

My boyhood trauma is not unlike the experiences faced by all returning missionaries, **perhaps you**. As someone who left home in obedience to God, your world expanded, your value systems changed; now a neighbor can be anyone whose need you have seen - and felt. If your return was to the western world, you're probably dismayed at the rampant materialism that has a grip on hearts. (Yours too - if you're honest - before you went out!)

So what's the answer? How is re-entry eased? You'll have to read the book! Seriously though, we have tried to set out some practical "helps" interspersed with stories of smooooooth landings; and to keep it realistic, spiced with a few crashes - and how to avoid them! Happy Landing!

Are you listening to God? What is He saying to you, your church, your city, your nation? How will you respond to what He is saying?


Hearing is with the ear listening is with the heart. When you listen, you'll get revelation and understanding, and

This, the thirteenth edition of IN TOUCH, is dedicated to the memory of two men who both went to be with Jesus in 1992 - one near the end of his race, the other barely in the starting blocks; the one having served the Lord steadily and faithfully for many years, the other showing all the promise and zeal and enthusiasm of youth aflame for Jesus.

We can perhaps explain the one. Bill Goulding had lived a good life. He was a fine husband to two wives (Jane, his first wife, preceded him to heaven by eleven years); and he was a loved and respected Dad to two families of children. Bill headed up all the electrical work at the University of the Nations

construction site in Kona. A couple of years ago, he and his bride Marcella "retired" to Yakima, WA. (Marcella, who served as Loren Cunningham's secretary, is probably the world's No.1 YWAM cheerleader.) In August, Bill passed very suddenly into his reward.

So did Bryce Enns, a few months earlier.

It's just about impossible - on a human level - to explain why Bryce's life on earth ended. Hailing from Abbotsford, BC, he was trekking to a Himalayan village on his SOE outreach in Nepal. House of Peace

On October 29th, by the grace of God and the obedience and faithfulness of hundreds of friends of this ministry from around the world, we moved into this promised place.



To mid-November almost 500 partners from 27 nations (including 42 American states and 9 Canadian provinces) had contributed almost 9 Canadian provinces, that start is \$100,000 toward the purchase price of \$336,000 (Cdn).

We're in! With the help of Hawaiians, Samoans, Chinese (from Singapore and Hong Kong!), a Native Canadian, an Englishman plus some plain old Yanks and Canucks, the move went smoothly. Already some visitors have commented on the peace they have sensed upon entering. All glory to the God of Peace.

Where do we go from here? We are carrying a \$200,000 six-month renewable first mortgage (currently at 6 1/2% interest). In addition, our bank (CIBC) graciously advanced us a six-month loan of \$50,000, as a second mortgage. This we are attacking head-on, believing that God would have it paid down very quickly, before the end of '92 if possible. Then we can chip away at the big mortgage.

Should the Lord speak to you to participate, particularly as 1992 comes to a close, our need is still there. Blessings upon you!
