## Pushing The Envelope



Back in the 1940's, aeronautical engineers built a radical new aircraft designed to be the first to break the sound barrier. Their "creation" was the Bell $\mathrm{X}-1$. A young test pilot named Chuck Yeager was among the aspiring aviators vying to be the first to "push the envelope" - to fly the X-1 to the edge of its inherent design limitations, and beyond; to go further into the unknown than anyone had gone before.
Nobody knew what would happen. Some thought a hole would be punched in Earth's atmospheric covering, allowing poisonous gases to pour in. Others theorized that the aircraft would simply disintegrate. No one really knew what the outcome would be, because it had never happened before.
Chuck Yeager "pushed the envelope," by breaking the sound barrier and living to tell about it. In his autobiography, Chuck makes this statement: "You accept risk as part of every new challenge; it comes with the territory."
To launch with joyous abandon into the stratospheric region called the "Unknown," is to partake of the risk of life with all its intoxicating aromas. For those who dare, there is a fresh new dimension which always beckons the soul that is unsatisfied with the dreariness of the status quo. Some call it risky territory. I call it the realm of creativity.
Can you imagine what the world would be like if God's gift of creativity had never been given? Without creation, there would be no world to imagine. Each of us is called to be a participant with Him in a variety of creative processes:
Like acts of faith, creative acts require courage and a willingness to take risks. The writer of Hebrews said, "Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen." This wonderful statement not only reeks with creative insight, it forms the very foundation upon which creative acts can be built. Both the person who walks by faith and the creative individual, refuse to accept the present environment which encompasses them. Rather than be acted upon, these people act upon that which is, in order to bring about righteous change.
For former YWAMers - or anyone - I have one simple question: "Are you willing to 'push the envelope?" To put it another way, "Are you willing to create with God in the place of prayer, knowing the risks that are implied in walking in radical obedience to the will of God?" "Creativity," "faith" and "risk" are different words for the same concept. Our benevolent Creator gives us the choice to move these words from concept to action.

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## Incredible Journey

Becky Yap was one of the last to escape from pre-communist Viet Nam in 1974. After four years in Taiwan, she moved to Hong Kong where she became an interpreter in a camp for refugee boat people fleeing Viet Nam. There she met Ruth Asselstine, a YWAMer from Canada, who led her to the Lord. It was a short journey to

DTS in 1983 (a gift from a Crossroader, Louise Loper), and then to a staff position in YWAM Hong Kong.
Jack Stuart made a more traditional approach to missions. Soon after Bible School he was touched by the message of a FEET team and the visit to his New Zealand homeland of the M/V ANASTASIS. Prompted to attend a DTS in Hong Kong in 1984, he too remained on staff. You guessed it! Jack met Becky; Jack fell in love with Becky; and in 1987 with the help of Base Director Gary Stephens, Jack married Becky.
Today they pastor a growing Chinese church in Christchurch, New Zealand. Starting from a small fellowship less than four years ago, the church now numbers 150 and they're believing for 300 by the end of ' 93 !
Becky is one of the firstfruits of YWAM's Hong Kong refugee ministry. What an incredible journey she's made, from zero pre-Christian church experience, to pastor's wife!

## CRASHED \& CRUSHED

This, the fourteenth edition of IN TOUCH, is dedicated to those who have "crashed" out of missions. (Blessedly, the vast majority have made reasonably good landings.)

There's a hoary old pilot's proverb that goes, "Any landing that you can walk away from, is a good one." Not!
Landing back on your home "runway" from a missions experience, is a challenge for anyone. Few there are who make "greasers" - landings so smooooooth that you scarcely know you're on the ground.
There are as many reasons for crashes, as there are people who have crashed.
For some, it happened while you were still on the mission field. You dragged your bleeding self away from the wreckage and tried to pick up the pieces of your life and carry on. You're still injured and healing seems far-off.
For others, the crackup came after you left the mission field. What you learned and experienced, what you became, no longer blended with your former life at home. And the collision has left you staggering.
No matter the cause of the crash, no matter the damage from it, there is hope for healing. In order to continue your life in a manner pleasing to God, others and yourself, put the past to rest. Bury it.

Just as young Joseph "buried" the bitterness and resentment he might have felt toward his brutal brothers, so you who crashed while still in missions, must bury those cancerous feelings in forgiveness, and be healed. Just as Abraham had a funeral for Sarah, the love of his life - and grieved deeply for her - then moved on; so you must bury the past and move on.

Forgiveness and funerals; they're highways to wholeness. Choose
 wholeness!

## "WORRYING ABOUT IT, WON’T CHANGE IT."
