

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WALKING IN DARKNESS

There is a darkness that can come to men and women of God that has nothing to do with sin, that has nothing to do with lack of wisdom, and has nothing whatsoever to do with the devil. And the tragedy is, when this darkness comes upon certain people of God, they don't understand what it is and it nearly wipes them out.

Everyone who has set his heart on serving God will have this darkness come at some point. Has it happened to you? You wake up one morning to find all spiritual feelings gone. You pray and nothing seems to happen. You read your Bible, and you understand the

words - but there is no Light. You search your heart and find nothing to match what you are going through. You rebuke the devil, go to hear your favorite Christian speaker - and nothing happens. No counsel seems to help. There seem to be no answers.

St John of the Cross called it "the dark night of the soul." Tozer called it "the ministry of the night"; Spurgeon preached about "the child of light walking in darkness." Each writer dealt with this differently, but the experience is common. It is not darkness of wrong or guilt or demonic expression. It is not sin. It is instead, an inexplicable sense of loss; an uncertainty. It is above all, a withdrawn sense of the presence of God.

You might be wondering, "Why is God doing this to me? How long will it last? How come when I talk to Him, He doesn't answer? Why am I not getting any revelation in my life?"

Probably because this is the only way that God has of teaching you some very important lessons. And those lessons are basically: Will you obey Him whether you feel like it or not? Will you do what He asks you to do? Will you hold on to the truth He has given you whether you feel He's there or not?

You say, "Of course I will!" Even when there's no sense of His presence?

Some of you have convictions that God has written and locked into your heart. You think that these are so strong and so unshakeable that you will never ever doubt them. Then the darkness comes and you begin to ask Questions. Are these convictions really true or not? What you will find out is whether you really do believe them. The darkness will test your convictions and the only thing when the darkness lifts from your life is what you really do believe.

So it was with Brenda & Heather & Lisa & Michelle - four young girls who woke up one day as MKs (Missionary Kids). Each of their families had joined YWAM Kona, Hawaii in the late 70's and early 80's, and thus much of their growing up years were spent in a missionary community, attending Grade and High School together.

Despite many people's concept of Hawaii as being the most exotic and romantic place on earth, these four girls took it as a matter of course: it was home because that's where family was.

Life on any YWAM base can be pretty challenging for kids, particularly when it is a pioneering situation, as Kona was in those days. Finances always seemed in short supply; living quarters 'snug'; food a bit on the dreary side; separated from aunties and uncles and grandparents; and perhaps hardest of all, friendships terminated when whole families frequently moved on.

But it wasn't all tough. These girls' family units were stable (as long as Mom & Dad were stable!); there was always lots to do - Heather and Michelle were in on the very beginning of King's Kids and travelled to Japan with the first KK Int'l outreach in 1979. All four girls served with King's Kids eventually, then following graduation went on to DTS - three of them to Australia.

Today all four are happily married; none of them are in YWAM - yet all of them are missionaries: Brenda (Shrock) Gibson is with Young Life in Colorado; Heather (Mansfield)

Galloway serves as full-time secretary in her local church in Illinois; Lisa (Herman) Shuler is Missions Director at Oral Roberts University in Oklahoma; and Michelle (Jordan) West is Fundraising & Programme Director at Wollongong City Mission in Australia.

Recently the four friends 'reunioned.' Brenda has a baby, Lisa expects one in April and the other two are wishing. One can only imagine the fine times they had together, reminiscing and revelling in their friendship, which is strong as ever. Here are some reflections that came out of their four days of fun:

"Growing up in YWAM was the best thing that ever could have happened in my life; from being in King's Kids to seeing God miraculously provide, I had experiences in my school years that most people would never have in a lifetime." ... Pitcairn Revisited



To negotiate the short distance from its wild and storm-tossed boatlanding, to the tiny settlement perched on Pitcairn Island's mountain, one must scale the Hill of Difficulty. The present road is an almost 45-degree, muddy cart-track, worn away by erosion. It is the islanders' lifeline for provisions.

In 1991, Loren & Darlene Cunningham along with others, visited remote Pitcairn aboard YWAM's third Mercy Ship, the Pacific Ruby. The need for concrete paving was obvious; a pledge to return and construct a permanent roadway was made, and now sometime between August and November 1994, an intrepid band of skilled carpenters and concrete workers will give a minimum of four weeks of their time and expertise in the adventure of a lifetime. PORTS OF CALL




The shepherd has his hands full.
