

FISHING IS CATCHING

n two separate occasions - after frustrating fishless nights - Jesus told His fishermen disciples to try again. Once He simply told them to cast their nets "on the other side."

Both times they were hugely successful as they changed the way they did things and followed the Master's instructions.

In this 'decade of change,' YWAM too, is going through changes, often spoken of as a paradigm shift (a fancy way of saying that we'll be doing things differently).

This means a re-orientation of the ways we apply our strategies in Evangelism, Training and Mercy Ministries. I believe that these changes are instructions from the Lord, and that they also apply to you as a 'former' YWAMer, both in how you are perceived and in how you see yourself.

What does this mean to you? Simple definitions of the three strategies might be, Telling people about Jesus, Teaching people God's ways and Helping needy people in practical ways. Telling, Teaching, Helping; each a demonstration of the gospel. If these become your motivation for why you do what you do, they can be applied as a value to every part of society that you touch. 'Casting your net on the other side,' then becomes, 'Go into the world of education, business, etc., and Tell, Teach, Help.

I see you not as a recipient of newsletters and updates; I see you as part of a sleeping giant, the largest ministry in YWAM (well over one million have served). This giant is not more active, because there needs to be paradigm shift in the way it sees itself.

Imagine one million people worldwide, motivated to *Tell*, *Teach and Help*, all involved in their own 'arena' of society as plumbers, doctors, typists, carpenters, musicians and so on. You are part of that giant, you haven't left YWAM - your arena has changed. If you only 'cast your net' through the formalized strategies of evangelism, training and mercy ministries, then you'll catch very little. But if you 'cast your net on the other side,' if you *Tell*, *Teach and Help* in whatever you're doing, you'll catch plenty. Remember, fishing is catching.

Finally, I'd like to hear how you are doing, what's happening in your 'arena.' After all, you outnumber YWAMers 100 to 1. You are the net, you are the other side of the boat and you are still in the mission.

Dear Friend,

I write to you the way Paul wrote to the saints in Philippi, I thank my God every time I remember you. In all my prayers for all of you, I always pray with joy because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now, being confident of this, that He who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus. It is right for me to to feel this way about all of you, since I have you in my heart... (Phil 1:3-7, then on to verse 11).

In early May I had a dream. The Spirit of God spoke clearly to my spirit, "The ministry of YWAM Associates International is to help My people fulfill My vision for their lives, through encouragement." Not man's vision, but God's vision.

I am so encouraged as I travel the world, to hear how former YWAMers are influencing their nations for God, just as we've been taught in YWAM - and Jesus himself said, Go and make disciples of all nations... teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. (Matt 28:19-20)

Early this year when I was in Samoa, I spent time with four pastors and their wives, all of whom had been through YWAM schools. One couple, Pastor Tino

A woman named Tai is leading intercession groups in her home. Tala, a graduate from the Early Childhood course at University of the Nations in Kona, is heading up a huge preschool. These ones are influencing their nation through the church, the home and education.

Next I went to Tonga, where I met Meleana who is having tremendous influence in the education system of her nation; she is teaching teachers how to hear the voice of God. She said to me, "Jesus

taking teams from his church out into missions.


Many former YWAMers have positions

Canada's capital, representing her people to the federal Government; and I know she administers her chiefly duties in righteousness and justice.

Tom & Mindy Buehring are serving as youth leaders in their church near Seattle. Tom is now also an influence in the media; he is a sports announcer for NorthWest Cable News, covering the three U.S. states of Oregon, Idaho and Washington.



In Singapore, Gwenda Loong is Director and General Manager for all of South East Asia, for a large company doing business worldwide. Her influence is in the high-powered world of business. Yet she finds time to organize and prepare for our Renewal Camps in that region.

I could go on and on sharing how you, as YWAM associates, are affecting nations. So, don't throw away your confidence; it will be richly rewarded. You need to persevere so that when you have done the will of God, you will receive what He has promised. For in just a very little while, He who is coming will come

and will not delay. But My righteous one will live by faith. (Heb 10:35-38)

I, and many others, are so grateful for all that you've given to the mission - in time, energy, giftings and resources; but we are also blessed and encouraged by the way you are affecting your nation for the Kingdom of God, through society's seven mind-molders: Business, Media, Education, Family, Church, the Arts and Government. No

matter what you turn your hand to, you can influence your nation for the Kingdom, be it raising children, driving a taxi or serving as a waitress. Remember,

Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for men, since you know that you will receive an inheritance from the Lord as a reward. It is the Lord Christ you are serving. (Col 3:23-24)

Peter and I, our Staff and Board of Directors, want to know if you will partner with us as we attempt to encourage former YWAMers, particularly those who struggle to find their place after being in missions. There are somewhere between one and two million people who have served long or short term in YWAM. Currently we mail out 16,000 copies of *InTouch* to people in almost 100 countries around the world. You are one of those. How do we 'find' all the others so that we may serve them? Here's how you can help:

 Comb your address book and send us names and addresses of your friends who served in YWAM. Keep your ears open - every time you meet someone who was in the mission, ask them for their address. You never know, someone living on your street or in your apartment building, may have served - it happened to us four years ago. The couple living in the apartment downstairs crewed on the Anastasis!

2. We've had 22 miracles of provision over the last eight years - one for each edition of *InTouch*. It costs an average of US .70c per copy printed and mailed anywhere in the world. That's just over \$11,000 per edition, three times a year. Now we feel the Lord is asking us to actively seek help;

will you help us? Will you ask the Lord? It's His ministry and we're simply trying to be obedient because we love Him and we love you. (See the Partners card enclosed for some ways you can get involved.)

3. Renewal Camps are great vacations and a real encouragement to those who come. Some associates bring their friends and family (including non-YWAMed spouses!). At one camp in Sing-

apore, a woman brought her parents and her Dad gave his life to Jesus! So consider coming to a camp this year. I'd love to see you there!

4. Intercede for this ministry and also for all those 're-entering' from missions.

Finally, I would like to say that we need you and would love to have a response.


