Hawaii. How wonderful to be called by God to those beautiful islands; the quaint thatched huts with the ants, the cockroaches, the rats, the downpours – we were on the rainy side of the main island of Oahu! Life in the tropics was less glamorous than the tourist posters had promised. But we hung in.

It was in Hawaii that we presided over the death and burial of YWAM's first ship; and it was there that God resurrected the vision – a much larger vessel that would sail the oceans of the world. Mercy Ships had been born in our hearts.

Before we had time to catch our breath, a Christian university was taking shape. And all the while, waves of young – and older – people were washing ashore on every continent and many islands... Asia, the Pacific, Africa, the Middle East, the Americas and Europe – both East and West. To every nation we went.

What wonderful memories stir in our hearts as we think back and remember what God enabled us to do; truly we can say, *all the way he led us.* (Deut 8:2)

But what of the present? And what of the future? Can we believe that the best is not behind us, but yet to come? The psalmist confidently declared, *But as for* me, *I will always have hope; I will praise* you more and more. (Ps 71:14)

God has led many thousands into YWAM; also out of YWAM, because He wants to use them and bless them in other places and in other ways. Do you believe that? Are you like the psalmist, hoping in the future and praising God in the present?

So you went... but are you still going forward?



I Have Control!

The Captain of an airplane, when he wishes to resume hands-on flying, says to his copilot, "I have control." The rejoinder that comes immediately is, "You have control." This little verbal exchange which takes place several times during the course of a flight, is absolutely essential to avoid confusion in the cockpit. Having control of an airplane is one thing. Having control of people is another.

For five years I was an air traffic controller, directing airplanes containing hundreds of people, along the airways of the sky. My job was to keep air traffic flowing in a safe manner and at all costs to avoid a 'clanger,' dark humor for a mid-air collision, an aviator's most feared event.

I have also been a controller in my personal relationships. A sharp look, a narrowing of the eyes – these are my instruments of control. My family – and others too – have been the recipients of these visual daggers. I think I'm doing better though, these days.

Back in my first YWAM school, I remember Loren Cunningham saying, "If you see someone taking responsibility, give that person authority. If you see someone looking for authority, watch out!" Power is authority run amok; control is the exercise of that power and usually comes from a place of insecurity. And the result is a legalistic approach to life, where rules govern and control every move. (*Some* rules are almost always necessary for the good of all.)

As Gene Edwards says in his book, *A Tale of Three Kings, "Legalism is nothing but a leader's way of avoiding suffering. Rules were invented by elders so they could get to bed early."

A friend of mine, Dr John White, says that controlling others is a form of witchcraft, which in itself is lust for power. King Saul demonstrated this through his rebellion – he wanted *more* power (I Sam 15). Leaders of ministries, leaders of churches, leaders of families – any kind of leader – must guard against the use of this satanic influence.

How can *you* know that *your* leadership is based on control? Your authority will be established upon rules and regulations – and fear. You will talk a lot about submission - in others. If you look back – if you dare to look back – there will be a trail of broken relationships leading away from your ministry. And the really scary thing is that you can justify to yourself that every single one of them left you because of *their* problems.

There is one kind of control that is admirable, and that is self-control, a fruit of the Spirit (Gal 5:22). Self-control is a fundamental characteristic of any good leader and a quality to be desired by all.

So let us all aim to be in the place where we can say, "I have control – of myself!" Once that is accomplished through God's grace, there will no longer be the need to control others.
