ow do short-term YWAMers adjust to the *in the world but not of it,* role? I hate the term *full-time* Christian service; it tends to divide those who serve the Lord in obvious ways, from those of us who earn a living by serving the Lord in the work place. It seems like we've chosen a *lesser* way. The high road versus the low road.

Being in a YWAM school was like a long retreat for me. Even when on staff, with all my responsibilities, I was given more to seeking the Lord and being fully concerned with things of the Kingdom.

Generally free from the normal daily tasks of providing food and housing, it was a tremendous opportunity to focus fully on Jesus and learn His ways. Marvelous teaching was available and during schools the daily input received would have taken weeks on the *outside*. It was a season of retreat – yet we accomplished much. The business was people – telling them about Jesus, or helping those who already knew Him, to come closer. It was marvelous – relationship is what man was made for – and what

fulfills him best... warm, open, vulnerable, loving, committed relationships.

In YWAM, each person normally experiences acceptance for who and what they are. For some, it is the first time in their lives they feel loved by a group. They belong. I have heard from some who have left, that one of the things they miss is the fellowship. It is that group feeling – being surrounded for the most part, by very dedicated believers who, by their very coming, have demonstrated that the Lord is more important than home or friends or career.

When we return to those homes and friends, that closeness is gone. In addition, we are again burdened with the daily task of providing for our own physical needs, along with those for whom we are responsible. But that very closeness we knew and longed to bring home, does not have to be lost. Our experience *should* help us to open up to others, giving them a taste of deep relationships. But that may involve the risk of being vulnerable.

There's another part to that spiritual dimension, compared to scratching for

a living outside. When we are surrounded by those seeking Him with *all* their hearts, *all* the time, we see our own dedication growing. How much of that though, is *really* ours? Is it perhaps just borrowed from the group? Are we spiritual because the group is spiritual? And do we give off the fragrance of His presence, *only* when we are in a field of fragrant flowers? Can He not send us out again to the stinky world to bring His fragrance there too?

We stand out here in the field, surrounded by grass and weeds, and wonder where the beautiful fragrances that enveloped us for six months – or six years – have gone. We got used to being filled with teaching, by simply opening our mouths to be fed. Now, our church gives us that once a week, if at all.

But if He had sent us to a remote village on the far side of Outer Mongolia, we would also have no daily teaching – other than what we received in our own quiet time. And close, daily relationships would not be there, initially at least. Missionaries have done that for centuries. What do we have to complain about, in comparison to their lot?

It's not easy, but we've got to go for it!

# Marine Reach... a New Name, a New Ship, a Familiar Ministry

She looked tiny! After ten years aboard the M/V Anastasis – a vessel the length of two football fields - this little ship could easily sit on our aft deck! But her smallness in size is not a reflection of the size of her new crew's vision. Marine Reach (formerly Mercy Ships – Pacific), has been operating small ships in the Pacific for ten years. Over 170,000 men, women and children have received dental and optical care across 15 nations. Thousands have come to know Jesus. The Pacific Link's new operating surgeries will be equipped to do dental and cataract operations.

Right now, YWAM's newest ship is being prepared for service, and she will be stationed in Lautoka, Fiji to serve the island nations of the South Pacific. As these two aging veterans of YWAM's ship ministry boarded the *Pacific Link* and were greeted by bright-eyed youthful crew, that old YWAMer enthusiasm was evident everywhere – gas torches cut through metal, sending sparks flying across the deck.

We felt old but young at the same time! We as alumni don't always realize the depth of investment we have made in the lives of these young people. It's the example we set and the stories we tell that make up part of their inheritance. As we toured this little ship, that pioneering spirit stirred within once again. That YWAM attitude that reminds us that, If God be for us who can be against us, was everywhere. Anchors Aweigh!

### I Commend to You...

I've made many mistakes in life – and here I would distinguish mistakes from sins: mistakes are errors in judgment, made with out malice, sometimes carelessly, sometimes willfully. For a follower of Jesus, sins are premeditated choices that hurt God, others and ourselves. Guilty there, too.

In the church tradition into which I was born, and to which I still adhere, it used to be that every time a new person came to our main service, whether visiting or joining, he or she brought a letter of commendation from their home fellowship. It was – and is – a biblical principle, that the Apostle Paul practised.

Read Romans 16 – which starts with, *I commend to you our sister Phoebe...* Paul goes on to commend dozens of others, many by name, his commendations coming in the form of greetings. Later, Paul actually commends John Mark, the young rebel who had caused so much grief between him and Barnabas (Col 4:10 & 2 Tim 4:11).

Back to me and my mistakes in this area. For most of my life, before and in YWAM, when employing someone, or inviting them to join us in ministry, I have trusted my own discernment. I have often been guilty of not obtaining commendations - just too much trouble; *or*, unnecessary in this case; *or*, we need to get on with things; *or*, let's just take the positive report and ignore the others.

I suspect that this malpractice is a common dis-ease of the body of Christ, in which we are taught to trust and believe the best. (Suspicion and believing the worst, are sin-diseases.)

But even when we do the right thing by obtaining the appropriate commendations, things can go wrong. I remember getting burned back when we were leading schools; glowing reference forms came in – on at least two occasions from spiritual leaders – and when those particular students arrived, the reason for the strong commendation soon became obvious! In charity, let's just say that the *commenders* thought we could help these folks.

In one smallish town where we lived for many years, the pastors of the various churches had little to do with each other. A certain worthless man would go from church to church, knowing he would receive charity, 'taking' them for food and even money. When suspicions arose, he would move on to another church, and so it went. Finally, one pastor became concerned, and upon checking, discovered what was happening. The upshot? Many of the pastors started meeting regularly to pray together, to encourage one another and to

prevent the sort of fraud that had been happening. It should be noted that Paul also practised negative commendation! (Check out 2 Tim 4:14)

It happens in YWAM too. Leaders, trusting in themselves, will take on new staff without a commendation. And I've seen some people drift from base to base, burning and being burned in the process. As James once said, *Brethren*, these things ought not to be this way!

Of course the bottom line question is, are we asking God – and each other? Or, are we just plain desperate to fill a need?
