ell really . . . is there? After almost three years, we can raise a somewhat tattered standard and weakly cry, "Yes". In rash moments we might even mutter, "Hallelujah!"

YWAM is warm, wonderful, intense, and committed, so unlike any other day-to-day Christian experience, that leaving, is like charging into deep snow directly from a sauna. Perhaps from a spiritual perspective it's actually worse.

Treena and I missed the prayer support very much. In YWAM we prayed about everything and listened to God and to each other. To use another analogy, it was like jumping out of a burning building into a fireman's circular net, held by very dear friends. When we left YWAM, it felt like looking down and seeing only a



couple of mildly supportive figures - holding just one side of the net!

It wasn't all that difficult, because we had learned the principles of listening to God for direction, and we continued to press in as a couple. What was difficult, and this was a battle zone for which we were totally unprepared, was the return to the 'commercial life'.

We had absorbed and believed - and still do - that God owns everything and that nothing for a Christian, is 'secular'. Our problem arose in the way we applied this truth!

In our involvement with TV and Radio, we attempted to use every subversive opportunity to sow good seeds, and prayed constantly to be good witnesses. Our 'hidden agenda' clashed with the media's policy that JESUS has become an important commercial opportunity. It's not that the media is hostile to the Gospel, it is simply that Jesus has become good business for them!

After many, many months of pressured misunderstandings, we had a major breakthrough. By switching our commitment to being the best of servants in our given task, and leaving the work of evangelism to the Holy Spirit's prompting within us, we have become far more effective in both our witnessing and in our commercial work.

So, I would say, be very good servants to whomever you serve, and pray for the Holy Spirit to keep you sensitive to those who are ready to receive the gift of life. Work well with your local church as an encourager to others.



Four 'Cooks' and their Samoan leader Vaeluaga, joined by one 'palangi' (white person), are now ministering in Native Indian reserves in B.C., Canada and being wonderfully welcomed. They spend a good part of their time living right in the reserves, developing one-on-one relationships and discipling those who want more of the Christian walk. One young Native Canadian, led to the Lord by Vaeluaga and some Maoris a year ago, has joined the team and is hoping to go to a DTS - in the Islands!

A Wycliffe couple who has labored for 28 years among these Native Canadians, has taken the team under their wings, and is thrilled at the rapid progress being made. What's ahead? More teams planting permanent works: Native Indians attending DTS's and then becoming crosscultural missionaries themselves. How about this? North American Indians to India!



That is not his real name, and you shall see why.

I travelled with Joe on a mobile team, soon after his six-month stint in YWAM, during which the Lord had done wonderful things in his life. After DTS, God had called him to full-time ministry in his home church. Now he had taken a few weeks leave to travel with us on the mobile team.

Athletic and musical, Joe had a great love for Asians, planning to return as a missionary to the Far East location of his DTS outreach. But that was not to be. Coursing through his veins, lurked a silent, deadly assassin. Joe was an

unknowing host to the lethal AIDS virus.

Our mobile team concluded its ministry and we all went our separate ways. When next I heard of Joe, he was in hospital with pneumonia - the killer had come out of hiding and the word was out. Then we met unexpectedly at a wedding. (Question: "Is it OK to hug someone with AIDS?" Answer: "You'd better!") He asked if we could talk. Sadly, we never got together.

News came that Joe was back in hospital. Upon calling, I was informed that he had been released, his whereabouts unknown.

What transpired next came to me from a friend who visited Joe, by now at home with his loving family, awaiting the inevitable outcome of the withering plague. When asked what he would share with a group of people given the opportunity, Joe gave a clear reply: "To Christians, 'holiness is no option': and to unbelievers, 'there are no riches like the ones that are in Jesus.'"

Hours later, Joe passed into the presence of his Savior, to enjoy those eternal riches.

Jamaica Reconstruction Team

Hurricane Gilbert left 500,000 homeless in Jamaica . . . YWAM's IMPACT team from U of N built 20 homes and even more relationships . . . the local churches took the initiative, deciding who would receive a house . . . by the end of the project, ten young Jamaican men with no construction skills, were able to build a 12' x 16' home by themselves.
