

Jesus told the story of a master who had to leave on a trip. While he was gone, the master entrusted the care of his possessions to his servant. Unfortunately, the master was delayed on his trip, and the servant began to act up. When the master finally returned and saw what the servant was doing with his possessions, he had the servant punished. In concluding this parable, Jesus said, From everyone who has been given much, much will be demanded; and from the one who has been entrusted with much, much more will be asked. Luke 12:48

When a person invests money in the stock market, in a building project, or in a trust fund – even in a savings account - that person expects to get a return on that investment. They anticipate that their investment will make a profit.

What has God given you as a result of your missions exposure and experience? What has he entrusted to you?

You will have stepped out and walked by faith. In the process, you have seen the reality of God, much like Peter did when he stepped out and walked on the water.

You also have had the unique opportunity of seeing and experiencing things firsthand that others only read about... or see on television. You may have lived in a foreign culture among people who think and act differently than you. As a result, you have changed; you are not the same person you were when you left for the mission field.

What is God's return on all that He has invested in *you* during your time on the mission field? How can you take the experiences of the mission field and see them multiplied for the kingdom of God? How can you transfer to others in your church what God has invested in you during your time away?

Be an Advocate (one who speaks on behalf of another; pleads for, defends, recommends publicly). You can become an advocate for the people group – or nation – where you have served.

**Be Informed.** Continue to take an interest in the people with whom you worked while on the mission field.

**Be an Intercessor.** While on the mission field, you probably felt the reassurance of knowing others were praying for you. The work of the missionary and the work of the intercessor go hand in hand.

**Be a Giver.** While serving on the mission field, you were probably the recipient of other people's generosity. Once home, one of the best ways to keep your heart tied to missions is through financially supporting other missionaries – and encouraging others to do the same. (*Where your treasure is...*)

**Be Supportive.** Missionaries often need people back home to help with their financial matters, to send newspaper clippings, church bulletins, familiar food items, to copy and send out their newsletters - and hospitable people to stay with when they return home.


Be Part of a Missions Board. You will have fresh insights and up-to-the-minute experience and enthusiasm to offer a missions board. (Some churches have their own structure and requirements, so it may not be possible to be a member. However, you can pray for those on the board and offer to serve them in any way they may need help.)

**Be a Recruiter.** God may have called you home so you can be instrumental in sending ten more people to the mission field to take your place. You can mentor other Christians in how to become a missionary.

**Stay Linked.** Dont expect too much communication from the people with whom you served. They will continue to grow and change, and understaffing is endemic to missions – (Jesus said so! *The harvest is ripe, but the workers are few...*) *You* can initiate communication.

God would like to see a return on His

investment in you... so be worthy of that investment, and be a *Missionary for Missions*.

### The Challenge of Submission



Here are some provocative thoughts from Margie Limberg of Germany, who wrote 'Fragrant in a Stinky World,' the front page article for inTouch last June...

A few nights ago, my daughter asked me, "When I become a Momma, will I know everything like you know everything?"

That is the thinking of a child. Children think their parents know everything and that kids are expected to obey their parents. With that same reasoning, in the minds of some people, followers are expected to obey their leaders (who must know everything!).

Now, that is *not* the teaching on submission that I heard from Loren Cunningham!

Sometimes the teaching on a submissive heart and attitude was translated by leaders into black and white: you're either submitted or in rebellion. There was little or no room to discuss or ask questions – even in the right attitude. And in some followers, there was a wide-open embracing of the submission principle, just like my daughter, who thought I knew everything – and that I made no mistakes.


Were we not sometimes too childlike in obeying our leaders? And maybe when the leader shows his or her faults, we respond like teenagers who just discovered that Mom & Dad are flawed and can make mistakes.

I had a difficult experience in YWAM, and it could have hurt me. But being on outreach staff and being so often on my own with a team, I had to dig in and listen to God's voice and instructions, and He led me out of the fire. This is how it happened...

The outreach leader accused me of a major character flaw. I cried out in my heart to the Lord that this was wrong and asked Him how I should respond. The Lord said, "He doesn't know what he's talking about, but you respond rightly anyway." I did what the Lord asked of me, and for the first and only time, I prayed that the outreach would end early. God did it through no action on my part. Although it wasn't easy, I was able to walk away without being burned.

The Lord teaches us to walk through these things as followers; but it is necessary to see that leaders can make mistakes too, and to be able to trust the Lord in the midst of faulty leadership.

Ask the Lord how to respond in the midst of your 'fire.'

date, 33 Associates have visited the orphanage which houses 300 children from 13 minority racial groups of that nation. Their mission? Simply to go and serve the children as uncles and aunties in true Asian tradition, playing with them, cooking for them, and teaching them language, songs and games – just plain loving them! During one such visit, 40 children felt the presence of God and received Christ!

Some have contributed practically by helping to fund a farm start-up which will provide food for the orphanage – enough to buy 400 chickens, plus pigs, fish and goats. One businessman Associate funded a tribal home – the House Of Grace – for the orphans of a tribe.



#### Just Do It!

### **Shorties**

**Welcomes.** Although we are seldom invited *to go into all the world...* (usually we're sent), when we get to where we're going, it's hugely important to be welcomed. In some cultures, without a welcoming ceremony and protocol, missionaries have labored for years with little to show for their sincere efforts. Westerners are especially likely to bypass this simple yet vitally important key to people's hearts – which is where we really want to go. After all, which of us would barge into someone's house without a welcome? We call this *breaking and entering*, Perhaps we do this in missions. (See photos on Page 3 showing an Island welcome.)

Jesus the Joiner. We all know Jesus was a carpenter (a joiner, in many parts of the world, is a carpenter). But he was also a *group joiner*. He joined us – voluntarily – here on earth for 33 years. He joined a dozen misfits together, who while He was with them, didn't look like they would amount to much. He rejoined His heavenly Father, and we know one day he will rejoin us. I hear about a lot of non-joiners today, people who think they can make it on their own without being part of a group. Mistake. Big mistake. Are you waiting for the perfect group or church? You won't find it – Jesus didn't. We all need to be part of a group, in submission and accountable to one another.

**Purple Hearts.** In the U.S. military services, when a person is injured in the line of duty, they receive a medal – it's called a Purple Heart. (You may remember that Forrest Gump received one in the movie, but we better not go there.) If Purple Hearts were handed out to anyone wounded in the service of God, I wonder if there would be a higher or lower ratio of wounded to unwounded, than in the Armed Forces... What do you think? And what might you do about it?

**Foxhole Friends.** A foxhole is a pit that one or two soldiers dig for themselves to gain protection from enemy firepower. Close relationships begin this way, as men hunker down in safety. Deep things are shared. A DTS is sort of like that – it's a secure place (or should be); it is largely protected from the enemy; and deep and lasting friendships are formed.

Second Hand. Used cars (sorry, pre-owned cars); hand-me-down clothes; second hand smoke – all these have negative implications. But there's one second hand item that is better than new, and that is a compliment. If I see or hear you do something good, I should tell you – not to make you proud, but just to affirm you. But, if I also go to someone else and tell them what a great job you did, and it gets back to you (second hand praise), you say to yourself, "Wow! He really meant it when he said those nice things about me."
