At Gordon-Conwell College, while taking his Masters of Divinity, he met Judy who was majoring in Missions: an alliance of their lives and ministries began.

After two years of pastoring a church in New England they joined YWAM in Hawaii for their DTS and SOE. Burning within them was a desire to bring a greater emphasis on God's Word into the Mission.

Invited by Loren Cunningham to start a School of Biblical Studies, their first class graduated seven students in 1982. From such humble beginnings the school has multiplied out to South Africa, England, Hong Kong, Switzerland, Chile, Honolulu, Singapore, India, Hong Kong again (Cantonese) and Australia, with one thousand already

trained. And new schools coming soon to Uganda, New Zealand, American Samoa, Philippines and Kenya.

The inductive approach to the Scriptures is used, whereby the student observes what the text says and lets it shape his beliefs, (as opposed to the deductive method, where

one comes to the Word with established beliefs, searching for support for those beliefs). In the course of nine months each student will read the Bible through five times!

As Ron and Judy well know, knowledge by itself puffs up and makes proud. For that very reason, application of the Word is given major emphasis - allowing God to change the heart and life of the learner. As a wise old preacher once said, "The more I read the Bible, the more I see the need for change in me". That sort of attitude, embodied in Ron and Judy is what fuels and fires the School of Biblical Studies.

Did you ever wonder how many people it takes to support one missionary? A businessman in Oakville, Canada did some research amongst a few churches and denominations and came up with rather startling statistics. These figures are by no means comprehensive, but should provoke some discussion.

U OF N GRANTS AMNI

All former YWAMers may receive credit for past YWAM * unregistered schools, UP UNTIL DECEMBER 31, 1990. After that date, it is too late. In other words, if you wish to receive University of the Nations credit for your past YWAM schools, you must do so before the end of this year, and under the following conditions:

1. You must take the initiative to write to the Registrar's Office in Kona and request to become a degree candidate. You should include as much documentation as possible concerning the YWAM schools you wish to receive credit for. If no formal documentation exists, contact your past school leader (s) to obtain the relevent data. School dates, number of full learning weeks, number of outreach weeks directly related to the lecture phase, name of school leader, and content covered all must be documented. Full credit will be granted for past YWAM schools, based on the number of full learning weeks, where

full documentation is forthcoming, and if the past school fits into the student's program.

2. An evaluation of your work as a student must be provided. Since in most cases this was not done formally, the school leader, or assistant, should be tracked down. A letter from the school leader evaluating the student's work must be provided for the degree file.

disillusioned, and altogether unsure that he "fit in" as a missionary. Wisely, he and his faithful wife Kit, committed themselves actively to ministry in their home church. Happy as they were however, missions seemed to keep "pulling" at their heartstrings. After a couple of years, back around the mountain they went, first to a crisis home ministry on the island of Oahu, then again to Kona, uncertain of what the Lord had in store.

Providentially, Gene got involved with computers, and quickly found himself hooked. Dbase, DOS, Wordprocessing, networking, PC, RAM, and such "today" words, became the lingo of his livelihood. Finally, he had become a round peg in a round hole. Gene discovered that he had a natural aptitude for this electronic world, and that in addition he was gifted as a teacher.

Life and ministry took on new meaning, as Gene became an integral part of the complicated computer operation at University of the Nations. On call 24 hours a day, he found himself in constant demand as a largely self-taught computer whiz.

Today, Gene and his family reside

near Seattle, where he partially supports his ministry to missions by accepting occasional outside computer-related contracts. He still considers himself a full-time missionary. Call him anytime with a glitch in your hardware, (or your software), and likely as not he'll bail you out.

THE FIFTH EDITION

This, the fifth edition of IN TOUCH, is dedicated to the memory of Heather Duffin of Sydney, Australia.

Trained as a Registered Nurse, loved by all she knew, Heather had a call to missions that led her into DTS in September 1984 in her native land. A seven-week outreach to India in early '85, gave her a love and compassion for the teeming masses of the subcontinent, and a desire to return.



HEATHER DUFFIN

After a few weeks of nursing at her Alma Mater - the Seventh Day Adventist Hospital in Sydney - Heather enrolled in the Canberra SOE.

Heather's parents, Roy and Marj Duffin, attended the final Love Feast for the SOE in early August. Her Dad remembers the occasion vividly, particularly one song - "Whether by life, or whether by death, I will serve the Lord." Heather put her head on her Dad's shoulder, and sang it to him. Soon afterwards, Roy and Marj released their daughter to the Lord.

Shortly before departing on outreach - once again to India - Heather had a dream. She was in prison, afraid, when a voice said "Look at the light!" Recalling the whole dream for her Mother, she said, "Mum, you should see the man the Lord has for me!" About that time, a friend had a dream in which Heather died, although no special significance was given to it at the time.

As she kissed her parents goodbye at Sydney Airport on August 9th, she recounted the words of the Apostle Paul: "For to me, to live is Christ, to die is gain." And off she flew to meet the man of her dream.

Five weeks later, at 1700 hours on September 15th, 1985, in the town of Lonavila - near Bombay - Heather met the Light of her life. She died as a result of complications from fever, dehydration and shock, despite the best available medical attention.

The theme for her Memorial Service was "Counting the Cost." Heather had already done that.

Roy and Marj Duffin, along with YWAM Australia, have established the Heather Duffin Memorial Fund". All gifts received will go to the support of national Indian missionaries, so that the grain of wheat that was Heather, may bear much fruit, within and out from the nation for which she gave her life.
