More Than Words Can Say

Every one of us knows how painful it is when someone says, "I love you," while their actions don't show love. Most have been so disappointed by hollow words of love that we would rather not hear those words than to be repeatedly disheartened by unfulfilled expectations.

For generations the world has listened to the Christian church proclaim, "God loves you and so do I." I look at our world today and wonder if our words have healed or wounded, if our actions have backed up our words of love.

The Bible says in Matthew 5:14, "Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven." Good works. It seems something almost makes us want to push those words away. Since the Reformation, the church has avoided anything that might look like we're trying to earn our salvation.

As a result, we have not only abdicated our responsibility, but also the privilege of showing God's love for the world. We've almost come to expect the government to feed the hungry, house the homeless, and provide health care for the sick. Unfortunately, the government's "good works" do not cause people to glorify God in heaven. However, when we combine actions of love to our words of love, we open opportunities for the unbelieving world to praise our Heavenly Father.

I'm encouraged as I see more and more Christians waking up to the fact that "faith without works is dead." I'm seeing more "good works" than ever — homes for unwed mothers, feeding programs for street people, shelters for the homeless — that are flowing out of a living faith. Love is becoming a lifestyle in the body of Christ.

There are opportunities all around us to demonstrate the love of Christ. Will those good works save us? No, but others will be saved because of them. Let us step out and grasp opportunities for good works so that our Father in Heaven will be glorified. *Question: "What was the sin of Sodom?"

MOTHER'S CHOICE GOD'S CHOICE, TOO

Imagine for a moment that you are a 15-year old girl, born and brought up in Hong Kong. Something is wrong, your tummy has started to swell, you haven't been feeling well. Taken to the doctor, you discover - to your surprise that you are six months pregnant.

"This is quite a typical scenario," says Helen Stephens, Founder and Director of Mother's Choice, a 2 1/2 year-old ministry to unwed mothers and their babies. "Because of lack of knowledge or shame, the problem does not get dealt with until well along in the pregnancy. We provide a loving home for the girls, an alternative to abortion. and tender care for the babies.'

Soon Mother's Choice, now able to hold only 24 infants, will have facilities for 60. Ninety percent of the babies will be chosen for adoption, (half of those going overseas), all done through the Hong Kong Social Welfare Department. But until they are matched up to their new parents. Helen and her staff of 30 full-time, and 140 part-time workers, care for these precious jewels.


From Pot to Pol Pot

bench in Apia, Western Samoa, in February 1977. I was enroute to Asia, a tired hippy fleeing a collapsed marriage, drug dependency, and failure in business and education. An

outreach member from the '76 SOE in Kona, asked me home to supper. I staved for two. Decision time brought me immediately to the first DTS at King's Mansion in Kona.

"I think I really came to the Lord during the DTS. At



After three years in Kona, John joined a team headed for Thailand, just across the border from the Killing Fields of Cambodia. Words cannot describe the human tragedy as 500,000 refugees, innocent pawns in Pol Pot's chess game of terror, streamed into hurriedly throwntogether camps. YWAM teams gained an entree into the camps through a willingness to serve other organizations.

For eight years John worked in the camps, becoming coordinator of all medical and other projects in the border camps. During this time, a Norwegian preschool teacher named Tove, hove into John's view. They were married in the camp church, so that their refugee friends could attend.

John continues his story, "Tove and I...had been going and going and going, and longed for some reflection time. We seemed to be going so fast, that we never took time to learn from our mistakes...the demands of living, worshipping and working within the same team amplified tensions which arose. By this time we had two children, one of whom had been quite sick. It was time for a

"But what does one do after 11 years in YWAM? Is anything of what one has learned, transferable to that


"YWAM found me on a park 'other' world? If we left, would we be failing God? Backsliding?"

These and other questions nagged John and Tove, as they struggled to know if they were to stay in YWAM. Following School of Biblical Studies

> in England, the Paddons 'stepped out,' where they found that 'the other world' required greater faith. They discovered that they had to some extent, been living on 'team' faith. Believing within the group was easier than all alone. John concludes,

"We returned to my native Canada church background; we needed to build relationships for prayer and financial support; and Grannies had lacked time with their grandchildren.

"The return was more than reverse culture shock. We'd changed through our overseas experience, and so had our perception of the West. It wasn't just re-entry, but 'exit' from the YWAM culture and all that it signifies, vis-a-vis social needs, spiritual support and commonality of interests and values. These last two years have not been without



The Paddons now live in Mississauga, Ontario. John works with World Vision, where his experience in soap-making learned from a Vietnamese refugee! - opened the door for him to pass along this and other skills, in Malawi and other countries in Southern Africa. It is in their hearts to return to YWAM.

PRO-VALUE

Pro-life, pro-choice, anti-abortion, anti-choice. Confusing, isn't it?

Bev Kline is pro-value. She believes that all of us have God-given value, right from that mystical moment of welcome in our mother's womb, and on through all the days that are planned for us. And she believes it with such conviction, that she's doing something about it.

At her YWAM Texas base, Bev has established a three-fold ministry center, now in it's ninth year, and known as Living Alternatives. Pregnancy-testing, Mom's Home, fully-licensed Adoption Agency - these three, the one following the other in natural sequence.

From the time a troubled girl walks through the doors and into the tastefully-appointed center, she becomes aware that Bev and her staff really care. And if her worst fears are realized by a positive pregnancy test, she finds that this care extends not just to her baby, but especially to her. Furthermore she'll discover that the caring includes others, such as - her parents, the father of the child - even his parents.

If she moves into the Mom's home, our mother-to-be will be subjected to no pressure to put her child up for adoption. The decision will be hers. Many opt to keep their baby, and help is available on a continuing basis for mother and child. In the home, emphasis is put on spiritual growth, personal discipline, and preparation for what lies ahead. "Clearly," Bev says, "adoption is as much of an emotional trauma to the mother as having an abortion. In either case she is going to have to deal with her rejection of the child."

Dozens of loved babies have been carefully placed for adoption, and 70 counselling centers have been 'birthed' from Living Alternatives in Texas. Training seminars are available - 120 have already taken them - what about you? Does your church have a vision for such a ministry? Do you? If we the church, don't rise up and do something, butchers are still waiting, who will.

WHERE DO YOU START?

Of Brazil's eight million street kids, 30% die before age 18. So where do you start? Johan and Jeanette Lukasse from Holland, start by rescuing, then restoring. Based in Belo Horizonte, the nation's third largest city, the 'House of Rescue' is the first step. Showers, meals, handicrafts, playtime and the gospel, soon reveal which kids are serious about wanting help, and they are invited into the 'House of Restoration.' Here the children learn job skills and are led toward the Lord through Bible study and personal discipleship. Johan and Jeanette's big vision, 'see's' rescue and restoration houses in all the big cities of Brazil.

DONNA'S CORNER

Here are some questions we should ask when in a predicament:

- 1. What would Jesus do?
- 2. What <u>did</u> Jesus do? (This requires meditation in the gospels, and understanding what God's Spirit is saving.)
- 3. What would Jesus have me to do, in this situation?

Few are Christ-like according to God's Word, because few are willing to pay the price it takes to represent Jesus.

One last question. Has adversity in <u>your</u> life strengthened your faith, or weakened it? (If weakened, the remedy may be the power and continual filling of the Holy Spirit.)

ADOPTION OPTION

Adoption is a mercy ministry. (After all, we as Christians have been adopted into God's family. If that isn't mercy, what is?)

Given that there will always be orphans, (fatherless, the Bible calls them), do we as Christians, even have the option of not considering - and praying about - adoption?

Loudly we denounce abortion as 'rape of the womb;' boldly we march for life; intrepidly we participate in 'rescues;' and unwaveringly, some even pay a huge price by going to prison for the unborn.

A prison term, hard though it may be, is still a short-term commitment. Who is ready to pay the price of longterm commitment?

Adoption is a long-term investment in life. It is fraught with uncertainties, costly beyond measure, sapping of emotions and haunted by the fear of eventual rejection.

But oh! the rewards of nurturing a spurned life, of bolstering a sense of value, of fostering hope - of simply obeying God, who tells us over and over again, to care for the fatherless.

Caring for the fatherless is one of God's commands, kind of like the Great Commission. Only He said it more often. It's a light load, (the burden;) a heavy cross, (the responsibilities;) but an easy yoke, (partnership with Jesus.)

Some house! Some call! Come with us as we take a meal to the 'home' of a Wanchai street-sleeper. His 'home' is a sidewalk, in the very shadow of the fanciest apartment tower in Hong Kong.

Beneath a ragged coat and tattered piece of sacking, lies the form of a human body. Peering up at us with untamed eyes, his hair long and matted with what appear to be great globs of evil-smelling tar, his face ingrained with years of grime, he snatches the proffered meal without a word, scrambles to his feet, and carefully places the still-hot box lunch in a nearby trash can. Then this piece of human flotsam - or is he jetsam? - lurches abruptly into the busy street, and disappears.

It's his daily routine, we are told. Later, he will come 'home' and reclaim his meal. Can you believe that even in this most abased estate, lurks the demon pride?

Formerly operated by YWAMers, this selfless ministry is now carried on by Jackie Pullinger and her team.

AIDS FOR AIDS

It appears that there are only three possible solutions to the AIDS problem:

- 1. A cure
- Immediate commitment to long-term monogamous relationships by absolutely everyone in the world.
- Full-scale testing, with complete isolation of all who prove to be HIVpositive.

The first solution doesn't appear close, the second would seem unlikely, and the third heartless. (What about those with AIDS from blood transfusions - especially hemophiliacs; what about babies born to infected mothers, and other tainted innocents?)

How can we reach out in mercy to the plagued? What is the church's response to be? What is our response to be?

One Associate wrote to us, "We have been amazed at the various reactions of people (in our church), to old friends who suddenly appear with the plague. Are they damned? No - they're born again, new creations and still have AIDS. Certainly...we have not come to terms with AIDS. We are surely missing the boat."

Is this unspeakable plague, judgment to the principal propagators - the homosexual, the promiscuous and the main-lining drug addict - or is it mercy? Could it be mercy? Perhaps. With the sentence of death already pronounced, the condemned one has time to reflect on eternal values. So yes, it could be mercy.
